Wild Guess

So did you recognise what it was? It's the tick which gives you Lyme disease. You know - that debilitating illness which we as orienteers should live in mortal fear of. And thousands of American golfers too! Or so was the hope and therein lies a tale!

When the boss's wife takes an interest in a product it needs to be treated with great care. That was chastening reality for scientists at SmithKline Beecham working on a vaccine for Lyme disease in the mid-1990's.

The disease, carried by tiny ticks which feed on deer, has terrorised walkers and fishermen in the US for the past two decades. Potentially serious, Lyme disease begins with a bite but can lead to facial paralysis, arthritis and heart conditions.

SmithKline pumped millions of dollars into developing the world's first vaccine against the illness, with enthusiasm from the boardroom when the disease was contracted by the wife of former chief executive Bob Bauman. Launched with much fanfare, annual sales were tipped to be as high as £300m, But the vaccine was quietly pulled from the market last week, after dismal demand from just 10,000 people a year.

So what went wrong with GSK's hyped attempt to kill the "great pretender" - so called because of Lyme disease's habit of mimicking other diseases? GSK's explanation is disarmingly simple. A company spokesman says: "Demand has dropped off significantly. It just didn't take off."

For Stephen Sheller, a Philadelphia lawyer, the truth is significantly darker. He says: "Any doctor who uses this thing has got to be the stupidest doctor around."

Mr. Sheller represents more than 350 plaintiffs who claim the vaccine, LYMErix, gave them a treatment resistant form of arthritis and an extreme form of Lyme disease. "We have got people who got shots of this thing and within days, they were in wheelchairs for the rest of their lives," he claims.

(Reassuring Note? While 17,000 cases were reported in America last year it is rare in Britain despite the fact that it probably originated in Europe. The number of cases in Britain last year dropped from 323 to 241.)



Winning Trio Beat Curse

Godfree, Buckley and Lenton storm to victory at the British Relays!

At the British Relay Championships on 6th May in Northern Ireland, the fantastic trio of Dave Godfree, Al Buckley and Tim Lenton took the title of British Relay Champions for "Team CompassPoint", beating rivals SYO into 8th place.

On the first leg, Dave Godfree (27) took a cautious approach to the race, and was left trailing after the first few hundred metres, mainly through bothering to look at the map. He then hoovered through the field, owever, managing to gain 4th place by the spectator control, perfectly visible to all anxious watchers, thanks to Interløpers' unmissable O-suits (Quality Silva kit from CompassPoint) - (Shameless product placement - Ed.). Dave took the final few controls carefully (or perhaps he was just knackered), to avoid mis-punching, coming home in a very pleasing 6th place, only 40 seconds behind leaders EPOC.

Al Buckley (27) sprinted off on second leg, finding himself at the front by the 4th control. He ran with Roger Goddard (WAROC) and Siggy Gould (EPOC) for a few legs, until he had a long split with an easily-missable ditch junction. Al slowed down to hit it cleanly, knowing that his

superior running speed (built up through countless Meadows interval sessions), would allow him to catch the other two over the easier sections of the course. He did exactly that. Roger disappeared on a longer gaffle, Siggy made a mistake in a thicket, and our hero found himself in the lead again over the final few controls. He said afterwards: "I felt very tired, but I knew that if I sent Tim out in the lead, he'd come back in the lead." (Unlike the other Tim who said in 1986 that if he went out in the lead he'd win-shortly before getting cuffed by some young whipper-snapper called Hale. Anyone got a copy of the video? - Dave) Tim Lenton (28) on the final leg was also confident that he had a good chance, especially with SYO star Jamie Stevenson being absent. A tricky control on a pond made Tim panic slightly, but he forced himself to be calm and focused for the next few controls. The rest of the course was straightforward, apart from one ESOC-style ditch bend - in the middle of a thicket! Tim said: "I knew where the d**n thing was, but couldn't see how to get at it." After punching the final control, Tim powered up the steep run-in to take victory for Interlopers, to the great delight of green and yellow O suits worldwide. Interlopers had a comfortable cushion over 2nd placed FVO, with EUOC taking 3rd, although the three teams were only able to field one Scottish-born runner between them - Kingussie's Euan McCarthy!

Interløpers were jubilant with the result, especially having lost British Champion Dan Marston to an early flight back to Norway. The title of British Relay Champions is a prize that Interløpers have been fighting for years to hold - has the curse of 2nd place finally been lifted?

I just thought I ought to let you all know about the sudden, untimely death of Bob Stobie yesterday afternoon (May 2nd), in Cape Town. He had had chest pains for a few months, and had been admitted to hospital for a triple-bypass operation, where he died in the intensive care unit following complications.

Bob was one of the earliest members of Interlopers, and was Club Treasurer for several years. He first encountered orienteering in Australia, when he was working at Mount Stromlo Observatory in the A.C.T., and was involved in the first Australian international teams, with his wife Mary. Indeed, he acted as local liaison for the Australian Team which attended the World

Championships at Aviemore in 1976. At the time of his death, Bob was Managing Director of the South African Astronomical Observatory in Cape Town, and had been overseeing the building of the 11-metre Southern Africa Large Telescope at Sutherland. He leaves his wife Mary, and their four children Caireen, Dearg, Craig and Rowena.





Getyour kit out

Silva Nomad

A compass for the digital age? You enter a bearing and the face shows you how far you are deviating from it. It also keeps a back-bearing to where you came from.

But I can do something similar with my oldfashioned flatbed compass. With the Nomad, you do not have to twist a bezel about and the digital read-out is easier to follow than a bouncing needle.

Accurate to one degree.

And what else? It compensates automatically for magnetic declination. The face is backlit for night use and poor visibility and the lithium battery lasts about 500 hours.

Sounds fine if you know the bearing you want. Or if you can see your objective and take a bearing from it.

But can you take a bearing



off the map? No, because it does not have a built-in protractor.

Bit of a drawback, then? You can get a rough bearing by using the Nomad to align the map north and south, then

turning the compass on it to point to your objective.

So, take your old-fashioned flatbed with you as well? Yes, this is not a complete replacement. But it is fun to have and easier to walk a bearing with, especially in poor conditions.



Should you be allowed to copy down your map before you start at a colour coded event? This suggestion sparked a lot or correspondence/debate in orienteering circles of late. I'm in with the Rob Lee faction on this one despite the fact that I could probably mark d the controls quicker than him. I hate copying down controls huddling under a plastic sheet trying to mark controls on a sodden map with a pen that is stubbornly refusing to work. Or substitute an orange tent for the plastic sheet and you can't make out any colour variations on the map and you can't see if you're marking the circles properly. Orienteering should be about your ability to navigate. You shouldn't be penalised because you take more care / a bit longer copying down controls. Why not have a 5 minute call up which gives you enough time to draw up your map but not enough time to plan your entire route. In the end BOF seem to have decided to leave the decision to the discretion of the organisers of events. Another storm in a teacup quelled!

Moray 2003 has been officially launched. The Scottish Championships saw the first appearance of promotional literature, entry forms, etc. The website is up and running too. Check out Aberdeen and Grampian Tourist Board for accommodation or if you want to go west cross the border into Inverness and Nairn. For newer club members it's a six day festival of orienteering fun held every two vears. It's a family oriented affair with a rest day in the middle so you can take a wee bit more time out to enjoy some of the delights and attractions of whatever part of Scotland it's located in. Numbers vary on the whole between 2500 and 4000 so it's an experience you might not have come across. it can also be as competitive as you want it to be. Midgeless glens beckon as Scots test 4ft zapper

They are the scourge of the Scottish summer, a bloodsucking menace seemingly resistant to any repellent. But the midge may have met its match.

Scientists in Edinburgh are testing a "midge magnet", said to be able to clear an area the size of a football pitch of midges by emitting carbon dioxide to attract them then zapping them with bug spray.

There are 37 different types of midge north of the border, but only five with a taste for human blood. They prefer the Highards and the west coast, and reach their peak in mid to late summer.

Researches at Edinburgh University found midges cost the tourist industry £286m, with 86% of first-time visitors saying they would advise friends not to travel to Scotland in July or August.

The 4ft by 3ft midge zapper, which contains a gas cylinder, has been designed by Calor Scotland and is to be tested by the university to see if it can be marketed. A company spokesman said it could be in shops by next summer.

For the first time they have established that some people are bitten more than others and that this depends on the behavioural and electrophysiological responses of midges to different people's sweat extracts. (My response tends to be "Get away you wee b****rds!" - Ed.).

The team collected human sweat samples and then tested them to see how attractive different sweat samples are to midges. They also conducted biting trials with live human subjects. The discoveries about how midges' antennae respond to human sweat could ultimately help entomologists develop new repellents to block receptor sites on the midges' antennae, and stop people being bitten by midges no matter how irresistible their sweat.
