When Britain were rowing towards a silver medal in the coxless 4's in Moscow I had a good idea what they must have been feeling.

Rowing up the West coast of Scotland for several hours was all part of being in a 5 'man' team trying to sail from Barmouth(Wales) to Fort William as fast as possible. The race also included an occasional stretch of the legs to run up to the summits of Snowdon, Scafell and Ben Nevis.

Somebody suggested to the makers of Stamisade(ex Acolade) that their sponsored/

sponsored boat would become more attractive as an advertising feature if it had some ladic on board. So as I happened to be in the right place at the right time I was asked to two other ladies to make up the running side of the team and help crew a 32' Trimaran under the leadership(captaincy) of Chris West(son of Morris West, the novelist)

With a lot of luck and a westerly wind we reckoned we could run fast enough to be amongst the contenders for the prizes. However with winds in the N and NE and occasionally not there at all we had to watch several boats sail past us before reaching the Lake District and again to Loch Linnhe.

This is a strange race which keeps evening itself out because of M the tides. We were 10th boat to approach Ravenglas but had timed it so well that we were able to sail straight up the tidal channel ahead of eight of these boats which had been waiting out-

side all night.

All but one of the 23 boats and their teams were held at Ravenglas until the next tide(10 hours later) so the Scafell run became a leisurely stroll and the race virtually started again as the tide came in and the boats slowly returned to upright positions and floated off.

All was going according to schedule - I had to be back at work on the Wednesday as we sailed across the Irish Sea round the Mull of Kintyre and up past Islay and Jura. We thought that four or five boats were in front of us.

The wind suddenly dropped and from racing along at 12 knots we were wallowing in

the doldrums (not a sea of lactic acid) ... or actually the Sound of Jura.

The crew were just preparing for a sort of holiday sun-bathing when a rear echoed through the rigging "Get out the oars." I had thought it unethical to row a sailing machine but in this case ethics didn't seem to matter and soon four of us were attempting to make progress with long heavy Wiking oars and two 'diddy' paddles.... Guess which sort they gave to me! This wasn't the sort of training and preparation I was needing to run up the Ben.

In the next 24 hours we rowed for nine of them with recovery periods as movements The Contract of the Contract of

of air were whistled up to keep the morale up.

All this muscle work did pay off because we just made it through the Horran rarrows (8 miles S of Fort William) before the tide turned. We were 4th boat through and the 5th one missed the tide(smirk). Jean Dawes and myself jumped ashore at Corpach at the end of M the Caledonian Canal and made our way up to the summit of Ben Nevis. Confident the next pair were a few hours behind us we stopped on top for a cup of tea offered by a friend who was looking after the marshalls. Imagine the fright we got when the next two pairs appeared coming up and we had only just started the descent.

We kamakazied it down and forced our legs to run the four miles along the road with constant glances back. We would have no chance against 2 good marathon runners in a sprint finish. They never appearde and we were most relieved and pleased to firm 4th in 4 days 21 hours, only four hours behind the leaders. The 23rd team finished
