



World Masters Games 2000, Melbourne Australia

In the Eades household January heralded a new era in our orienteering. We were now both veterans. This we felt should be marked in style. This year the World Veteran Championships were to be held in Bendigo to the north of Melbourne and combined with the World Masters Games. To those of you who are good at your trivia and statistics the World Championships in 1985 were held on the same area to be used for the Vets Final, the infamous Kooyoora State Park.

The Vets champs format consists of two qualification races with the top 80 going through to the A-final (or if there are less that 80 it determines your start order in the final). A large proportion of Australian orienteering terrain can be divided into either Spur-gully or granite terrain. The organisers had selected for the qualification races an area of Spur-gully terrain near Castlemaine. The area was very fast, open gum tree forest with smatterings of old gold-mine workings, and for added interest, kangaroos bouncing past. Courses were on the first day a bit on the boring side but were better on the 2^{nd} day.

The final was held on granite terrain, oodles of boulders, rock steps, flat granite 'roads', very fast under foot but wattle trees to reduce your visibility to a mere 2-3 metres. Mistakes on this area tended to be counted in 10's of minutes. It was the ultimate test of concentration and disciplined technique. A phone call to Y vette Baker (at 18 years old at the 85 champs she was competing in her second World Champs) before setting off from Edinburgh came up with a game plan of run as straight as possible (compass and pacing) linking up areas of flat granite (grey screen on map) combined with an ability to ignore most of the boulders and look at the contours was to be the order of the day.

So how did we all fare? Well, in true Interlopers style I finished 2nd in W35, Rob was 10th in what was probably the most competitive class M40 (Jon Musgrave 3rd), Colin was 41st on M35 and Geoff Peck was 5th on M50. Ben and Heather ran in the accompanying U35 Challenge and finished 2nd and 8th respectively.





The first step will be to visit your doctor so that the worms can be identified. From your description, it seems likely that you have been infected with a small roundworm such as Enterobius vermicularis (pinworm) rather than tapeworm, so don't be too distracted by the images of larger worms you have seen during your Internet search. Treatment with oral medication (such as Pyrantel pamoate or Mebendazole) is highly effective and it is best to treat the whole family. Good hygiene practices will be required to prevent reinfection, for example washing of hands before food preparation and eating, and frequent washing of underwear and bedding.

For those Elites amongst you who may be waiting until after the election races deciding whether to enter or not, special arrangements are being made to accept entries beyond the normal closing dates.


