

Yet another second place for an Interløper – but this time what a second place!!

As part of the GB team which won 5 medals, Scott Fraser achieved this great result at the recent Junior European Cup held in the south of England.

Running in the event Sprint around Harlow Town park, he had a bit of a wobbly start but produced strong performance in the second half of the race to grab the silver medal in a finish which saw 15 seconds cover the first three places.



Letter to the Secretary

(I've always considered being secretary of a club as being a pretty onerous affair; taking minutes, writing endless letters etc. John Barrow does (and has done for aeons) this apparently thankless task. However, a steady, if slow, trickle of emails and correspondence has made me realise that the ones we see from blond, 19 year old, Scandinavian, running lovelies seemingly gagging to meet up with Edinburgh orienteers are probably the result of a vetting process which means that John keeps the best ones for himself?! What does he say to them? How does he persuade them that a trip to 'the Reykjavik of the south' is what they're looking for? By selling them our outstanding local terrain, that's how! I offer the following letter as evidence)

Hello John,

My family and I are back in Sweden again, after having a wonderful time in Scotland and Edinburgh. I Edinburgh! I think it?s a lovely city. The handsome old-fashioned sandstone houses were really beautiful and the majestic castle was amazing! The surroundings with its hills covered with green fields on which sheep and cows grazed together (in Sweden different kind of animals are separated into different enclosed pastures) were nice to see. The red poppy flowers were beautiful, too. On our visit to Scotland we also went to Glasgow, Loch Lomond, and Loch Long. I also would like to tell you about the orienteering adventure at Colinton Dell. I really liked going orienteering there. I chose the green course, which I later realized was quite hard. Perhaps too hard for me, but even though it was tough I enjoyed it. I think I got all controls except from number one. There were big housing areas and a lot of steep hills, and I think I didn?t study the map properly, because sometimes while I was running I felt as if the hills surprised me, and had to climb or walk very slowly up the hills. The same sort of thing happened to me when I was running on the tracks. I didn?t notice any tunnels on the map, so when I came to a track crossing and saw there was a tunnel there, I could turn neither left nor right. I had to take another

way! This was my own fault though; I was too careless about studying the map. Next time I?ll study the map carefully before deciding which way to run to get to the control. The forest was a bit different from the Swedish ones. There was so much beautiful verdure and as there was a lot of water and rather moist, it actually reminded me of a tropical rain forest! And this forest was in the middle of the capital of Scotland! I really wonder what it is like to go orienteering in the country!! I think Colinton Dell is a beautiful place and (in spite of the difficulties) I really enjoyed going orienteering there. It was a good experience, and I am glad I went there. After I had finished the course me and my dad were going to go back to the hotel by bus, but a man who had also been going orienteering there drove us to St. Andrew?s square, so that we could take a bus from there out to Musselburgh and the hotel where we stayed. I think his name was Ewan MacKenzie, but I am not sure about his surname. He also had a son who was about ten years old and who had also been going orienteering at Colinton Dell. How kind of Ewan to drive us to the centre of city! If you happen to know him, could you please thank him from us? I am glad I could try orienteering in Scotland! It was absolutely great! If I?ll go to Scotland once again (which I really want to) I hope to go orienteering again. Thank you John for the information you sent to me about this orienteering event. It was really kind of you to give me your telephone number so that I could phone you when I arrived in Edinburgh.

A quote has been obtained for remapping Calder Wood.


Ben and Heather are putting on a limited colour coded event at Kinneil on Sunday 16th January.

When students are increasingly portrayed as living a life of 'sex, drugs and rock-and-roll', it is reassuring to know that the club has the likes of Scott who puts in the hard miles...

Hi Barry,

Here is the map of the JEC sprint race. It's a bit creased but I hope it is still OK to scan into the INT newsletter.

I had a good run, lost about 50sec in total which is costly in a sprint race. I lost 30sec on control 4 where I failed to spot the path between the houses (small path!). Slight 10sec wobble on number 7 (went to girls control). Another slight 10sec wobble on number 8 where I went right of the road crossing. Went through spectator quite far down but nailed last half (trickiest) of sprint race (getting fastest last 3 splits). I was 11sec behind the leader from Switzerland and 5sec in front of 3rd place Fabian Hertner who was 6th on JWOC classic.

To say that his map was "...a bit creased...", is a bit like saying that the Pope is a bit Catholic. Those of you reading this page electronically may be able to detect evidence of the patient hours of work required to ressurect the scrap of crumpled paper which appeared to have enjoyed a trip through a washing machine in the back pocket of Scott's jeans. Diligent use of freebee software (DaguerreoShop 1 – Croft Edition) finally enabled something resembling a map to emerge. What immediately strikes me (as one who regularly wastes time 'after you'-ing at the boxes and taking ages to dock his dibber – mmm! – at the finish) are the narrow margins involved. Another 12 seconds lost and Scott wouldn't even have been on the podium! His 30sec glitch to control 4 will send a shiver down the spines of those who did a similar thing in the rabbit warren that is Buckstone during the street 'O' series?

O-Ringen 2004

Orienteering is not a spectator sport. It isn't a sport to watch from the side-lines, to urge people on through the forest, groan as they miss the control, and cheer when they spike it. It isn't a sport where you can see who's winning and who's losing, who's speeding ahead and who's being blown off the back. Sitting in an orienteering assembly field is not up there in the World's Top Ten of Exciting Holidays.

I'd heard of O-Ringen. I'd heard of the multi-lane run-ins, the city-sized event centre. I'd heard of the vast numbers of people. 15 000, or so they say. When I got there, well, to be honest, it didn't feel as big as I imagined. It's hard to count 15 000 people all at once; they tend to come and go, waft in and out of your field of vision. Could just be the same thousand each time, for all you know.

The event centre admittedly was very busy and impressive, with a big café, access to the internet, and lots of advertising stalls. The campsites were really spread out, with lots of little sites in different places, rather than one large one, which didn't give an overpowering impression of size. Much more manageable than I'd imagined.

However, I'd also heard of the O-Ringen mud-baths, so Dave and I opted to go with Scottish O Tours and have a luxury week in a hotel. Paul and Hilary were also on the SOT tour, but they opted for a luxury week in Graham Kemp's flat in Gothenburg – just next to Jamie Stevenson's flat, and, very handily, on the Day 3 area – 500 m from Assembly!


Day 1 was great. A 3k warm-up jog to the start, then some very easy orienteering to get you going, cunningly followed by some rather trickier controls to catch you out. Unfortunately I got caught out by a small inoffensive-looking rock with a bad attitude, which turned out not to be the best landing place for my knee when I fell on to it. I finished my course, and even managed a slow-warm down. However, by the next morning, even the 3k to the start was impossible, never mind the ensuing 7k of orienteering. And thence followed 4 days of admiring assembly fields.

The organisers had gone to some effort to provide entertainment, by installing a

massive TV screen on 2 of the days. The first of these was to watch a mass-start race for the Super-Elite, and the second to show the chasing start races on the last day. The mass-start race was actually very disappointing, apart from the start where they stood in a big circle facing inwards and then ran in all directions at the word go! Virtually all the commentary was in high-speed excited Swedish (still, what would a Scottish 6-Day have managed?), and most of the time the TV showed an unchanging picture of empty forest - exciting! The best bit was when the winners came in, but if I was that interested, I could have stood by the run-in and seen it anyway. The chasing start was more exciting, because it involved far more classes and therefore less empty forest - although the bit with the lost baby deer was definitely the best!!

I suspect that I will return to O-Ringen sometime. Apparently it's something that every orienteer should do at least once, and I feel that for the proper O-Ringen experience, one should compete on at least more than one day! Next time, I'll try to finish all 5 days – all rocks, beware!

The race started well. The cloud was off the tops as Graeme and Scott stormed

The next checkpoint is a tarn on the moor, and I have to admit to being very pleased when we found it straight away! Several teams managed to lose 10 or 15 minutes there, with two teams not finding it at all — woops! We headed off towards the Kirkstone Inn, to set Colin and Dave off on Leg 4. They had a fantastic run, to bring us into 16th place out of over 60 teams! We were


