

Worst moments in orienteering. It was the 1975 New Zealand Orienteering Championships in an unpronounceable central North Island Forest officially designated by Swedish visitors as 'too thick'for orienteering. Ngutuwera was a vast mature forest of radiata pines with visibility of 5 yards caused by 12' high ponga ferns.Pushability was quite fast but real running was restricted to the network of paths, tracks and forest roads put in for forestry work and often overgrown. The weather was sub tropical downpour from dawn to dust and the organisation was stretched to the limits at master maps, starts and finish. Having not mastered either the sport nor the art of running in the rain with glasses on I was having a tough time wiping the rain off on any dry portion of my clothes. The ferns were each like a shower to push through and by control 5 I had no dry cloth left so glancing at my watch I pushed off into an extra thick 50 yd patch of ferns emerging some an extra thick 50 yd patch of ferns emerging some time later I again glanced at my wrist to calculate the rate per metre of fern progress. No watch. It had vanished into the jungle without trace. I wiped the rain off my glasses stuffed them into my front bib pocket and ran off blind to the next control. Having developed a technique of running blind without glasses until the approach to the control them published out. until the approach to the control then pulling out the specs ,wiping them clear and putting them on it was with some consternation that at control 13 I reached into my empty front pocket for the umpteenth time. No glasses. With only four controls to go it was on with the race and having nearly lost a shoe in a muddy hole and nearly torn my O jacket off on a thorn bush I was relieved to finish in 6th place. I really felt that if the course had been any longer the forest would have devoured the rest of me.

#### RABBIE BURNS AT BALUAIN

Who said Rabbie Burns had no links with orienteering? On a visit to the Blair Atholl area in 1787 his friend the Duke of Athole took him to see the Falls of Bruar. At this time the Falls of Bruar were unadorned by woods. "The poet, accustomed to the woody banks of the Ayr and Doon was not disposed to admire the barren sublimity of the Bruar and accordingly wrote his 'Humble Petition' in which the water requests the umbrage of birch and hazel from the hands of the noble proprietor". (Cunningham's edition of Burns poems 1835 - page 66).

The 'Humble Petition' of Bruar Water to the Noble Duke of Athole (1787) runs to eleven verses and obviously was a success as the area round Bruar was planted with woods and a path constructed. Later, the hillside to the east was planted. This is the area of Andy Curtis' map which is to be used in the Scottish 6 Day this year.

So next time you orienteer in Baluain Wood remember that you have Burns to thank for the wooded hillside.

By far the most important aspect of our sport is the overiding necessity for fairness in all matters affecting orienteering. This is because without 'fairness' our sport quickly becomes a game of chance as any who experienced old black and white no contour maps and events run by enthusiastic but inexperienced Scout or School masters, will testify. This 'fairness' must apply to every aspect of the Sport including Club organisational matters. In this regard the decision by a majority vote of the ESOC Committee to allow last year's controller of the Scottish Champs to have a competitive run this year but no other senior controller within the club to be allowed a competitive run although Junior club members can run, smacks of muddled thinking. Many of us are currently involved in hundreds of hours work for Tayside 85 and sacrificing competitive runs every weekend to ensure the success of the possible 3000 competitive runs each day. Has the ESOC committee assessed the input to the sport of all its senior members over the past three years in reaching its controversial decision? I have attended and helped at all the events run by the club since 1980 and found starts and finishes overmanned, enthusiastic and competantly organised. In this year's Scottish the late start allows a perfect opportunity for club members to run in the morning or alternatively in the light of the early evening after the main start. There is no reason why these runs cannot be competitive for the majority of club members who will attend to help on the day but cannot assist at pre-event bagging or planning sessions. Can it therefor be possible that the committee is trying to be'fair'to the volunteer planners, map over-printers and baggers by ensuring no one else gets a competitive run either? Orienteering organisation involves the sacrifice of a few for the enjoyment of many and by the compulsory sacrifice of the many the committee have put in jeopardy the FAIRNESS of Orienteering!

Dick's article raises a number of good points ie exactly how much help should each orienteer give compared to running in events? Is this something that can be measured? Should orienteers whose clubs are putting on events be allowed to run at these events? If anyone has views on this subject, Capital 'O' would be happy to give them an airing.

#### WHOSE WOOD?

#### BEN BATE

The story in the 'Scotsman', 1/5/85, about the 110 acre woodland between Tranent and Haddington, just south of the Ai called Butterdean, emphasises once again that without ownership control of the land is very difficult. The original owner of Butterdean, a broadleaved woodland, wanted to fell it to plant Christmas trees. However a campaign by Friends of the Earth's'Wood Watch' amongst others caused the owner so much trouble that he decided to sell. The new owners intend to use it for shooting.

At 110 acres, Butterdean is a little small for orienteering but as orienteers it is important that we protect potential orienteering areas and do not take tham for granted.

Friends of the Earth 'Wood Watch' have the aims of protecting Scotland's broadleaved woodlands and heightening public awareness about their vulnerability to destruction.

The Woodland Trust exists to protect and own woodlands. In 10 years it has purchased 4,000 acres of Woodland and now has 34,000 members. The Trust is in the process of developing its Scottish operation which, until now, has been slight. Further details from Woodland Trust, Westgate, Grantham, NG31 6LL
